1.Gathering Inspiration & Creating from Nature

Now it's time to step outside and take a walk in nature.

Let your gaze soften and attune to textures, shapes, and patterns.. the delicate veins of a leaf, the spiral of a shell, the way sunlight dances across tree bark.

Follow your curiosity, and allow the fairies to whisper clues about their world—how they might appear, what they wear, and the places they call home.

As you walk, notice what stirs within you. Pay attention to any feelings, words, images, or impressions that arise. These subtle messages may be part of the magic.

Gather little treasures from nature that speak to you—they may become part of your fairy's story.

And don't forget to bring your phone or camera to capture close-up details that inspire you along the way.

Here are the little treasures I discovered on my own walk.

While I encourage you to take your own wander through nature, if now's not the time, you're most welcome to follow along and use my findings to spark your imagination and create with me.





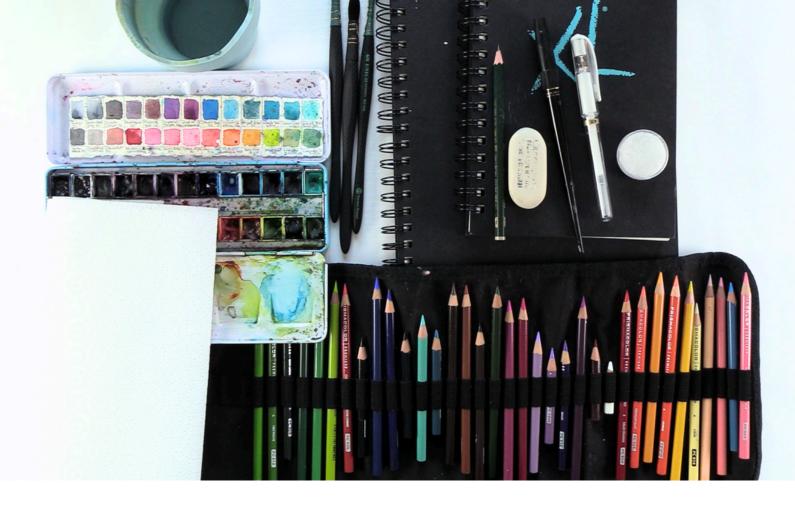

Supply List

- A4 or A5 watercolor or mixed media **sketchbook**
- Watercolors (I used some earthy colors from Daniel Smith) & some metallics from Coliro
- A few different sized watercolor brushes
- Color pencils
- Pencil & eraser
- Salt
- Water jar and napkins
- A pen to write with
- White gel pen or gouache

2. Creating a Nature Library Page

Begin now to create a visual record of your discoveries.

On the left side of your notebook, sketch 4–7 natural elements you find intriguing.

This becomes your personal library of inspiration for your nature spirit.



2.Imagining the invisible

Using your gathered shapes and textures as ingredients, begin to dream up a magical being inspired by nature.

There are no limits! Let your imagination lead.

Do you notice any features or forms emerging in the elements you sketched? Look closely—do the curves of a leaf resemble wings?

Do the textures of bark hint at scales or feathers?

Now imagine...How might this creature look? What shapes or colors would it borrow from its surroundings?

What might it wear—petals, moss, crystals, cobwebs? How would it move—flutter, slither, leap, or drift like a seed on the wind?

Let its habitat guide you. The forest, sea, sky, or stone might shape its entire being.

3.Story weaving & getting to know your creature

Develop a short story or backstory for your nature spirit. This deepens your connection and gives shape to your vision.

Ask questions like:

Where does it live?

Deep in a forest? High in the clouds? Beneath the waves? Inside a flower? Is its environment peaceful, mysterious, dangerous, magical?

· What time of day does it feel most alive?

Dawn, twilight, midnight, midday? Is it a creature of sunlight, moonlight, or starlight?

How old is it?

A young and curious spirit? An ancient being full of wisdom and stories?

What kind of personality does it have?

Playful and mischievous? Quiet and observant? Fierce and protective? Gentle and nurturing?

What emotions does it carry or bring to others?

Joy, comfort, awe, mystery, courage, melancholy?

What kind of energy surrounds it?

A shimmering glow? A swirling wind? A warm hum? A trail of petals or fireflies?

How does it move?

Slowly and gracefully, like falling leaves? With quick flickers, like a darting dragonfly? Floating, flying, slithering, dancing?

• Does it make a sound?

A chime, a whisper, a roar, a rustle, a purr?

What colors and textures belong to it?

Are they soft and earthy, bold and fiery, translucent and glowing?

· What role does it play in its world?

A guardian, a trickster, a healer, a dream-weaver, a messenger?

As you begin to weave the story of your creature, something magical happens—it starts to take shape.

A personality emerges, a presence stirs. Is it ancient or newly born? Bold or bashful?

With each detail you imagine, with every whisper of its world, your creature begins to breathe. It may dwell in moonlit forests or coral caves, sing in the rain or dance with fireflies.

Let your heart guide you. The more you listen, the more it will be revealed. This is where art and story meet—where your creature comes alive, not just in paint or pencil, but in spirit.



4. Bringing your sketches to life with color

Now it's time to bring your creature fully to life with watercolor.

You can use colors that reflect the natural elements you've drawn inspiration from—mossy greens, ocean blues, earthy browns, or petal-soft pinks.

Or, you can let your imagination take the lead and shift into a more whimsical, fantastical palette.. glowing purples, shimmering golds, or unexpected bursts of color. Let the story you've created guide you.

Think about where your creature lives, what kind of energy it carries, and what makes it unique. Your colors can whisper its personality... or sing it out loud.

Stay loose. Don't worry about staying inside the lines.

In fact, the more spontaneous and freer your brushstrokes are, the more character your creature will have.

Magic lives in imperfections. Let the paint wander, let the colors mingle. You're not just coloring in—you're breathing the soul into your creation.



5. Adding depth & detail

Adding a second watercolor layer brings more depth and contrast to your creature. Once it's dry, you can also use colored pencils to highlight certain areas and make details pop.

These finishing touches help your creature come alive even more—layer by layer, it reveals its magic.



In your free time, begin building your own reference library—a treasure chest of ideas and sketches you can return to again and again.

These exercises are meant to be fun and exploratory, not perfect!

Create as many little creatures as you like, inspired by nature finds. Use real objects, photographs, or even your imagination. Think variety—day vs. night creatures, young and old, male or female, playful or wise.

Keep it loose, playful, and expressive. You're not just practicing—you're gathering magical tools for your future creations.

And here is the final painting of Bernie, the wild child Full of mischief, magic, and a spirit as untamed as the wind!
